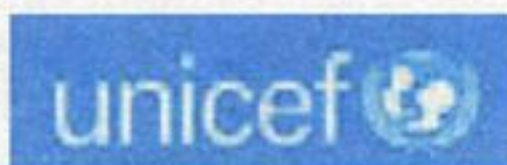

The ideal spokesperson - Her ability to speak (and sing) in English, French, German, Greek, Italian and Spanish, has made **Nana Mouskouri** an ideal spokesperson for UNICEF, and she has taken every opportunity to promote the rights of children, both in special field missions and while on concert tours. She began by visiting UNICEF projects in Mexico (1994), Chile (1995) and Viet Nam (1996). Following her return from Viet Nam, she joined UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador **Harry Belafonte** at a benefit concert in Chicago, during which he presented her with the World of Children Award from the US Fund for UNICEF.

Since then, Nana Mouskouri's travels on behalf of UNICEF have included visits to a school in Bosnia and Herzegovina, which was built with funds she helped raise, two trips to Kenya, and visits to Bulgaria and Russia. During the second of her Kenyan trips she gave a concert as part of a gala that raised more than US\$300,000. She went on to make field trips to Guatemala and, following a catastrophic earthquake, to Greece, where she visited camps for displaced persons and distributed school supplies to children.

Throughout her time as a Goodwill Ambassador, Mouskouri has tirelessly promoted the fundraising and advocacy work of many UNICEF National Committees. She appeals for support for UNICEF's programmes for children both in concerts and in media interviews. She has also made generous financial contributions to projects in Guatemala, Kenya, Uganda, Viet Nam, Bulgaria and Russia.

DID YOU KNOW ?

Kiwanis Club of Ottawa

One of 8,400 Clubs in Kiwanis International, and the largest Kiwanis Club in Canada, the Kiwanis Club of Ottawa(KCO) is one of the most active and dynamic service clubs in the world. Each year the KCO provides thousands of hours of community service and raises \$300,000 for the local community.

Founded in 1917, the KCO is one of **19 Clubs** in the Ottawa-Gatineau area that make up Division 12 and 13 of the Eastern Canada and the Caribbean District.

The KCO started and operated **Camp Banting** for diabetic children for its first 30 years - the first of its kind in Canada.

The KCO founded the **Ottawa Boy's Club in 1924**, now the Ottawa Boys and Girls Club of Ottawa, with continued support including \$25,000 to the Centretown unit in 1977 and \$100,000 to help build the Britannia branch.

In 1960, KCO helped establish the Ottawa Chapter of the **Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation**.

The KCO partnered with the ACT Advanced Coronary Treatment Foundation to establish the **CPR program** as a mandatory program in every Canadian high school.

The Kiwanis **Read-a-thon** started in 2003 with 15 schools in Ottawa and by 2007 had grown to **223 schools**, reaching **53,229** students in provinces across Canada, and schools in 12 countries. This program promotes literacy and motivates children to read at school and at home.

In 1998, the KCO released the video "*Never Shake a Baby: what parents and caregivers need to know*" to provide education on the issues and dangers of shaking a baby. The KCO also produced a video on the importance of early literacy. "*Precious Minds: Nurturing Literacy in the Early Years*".

In 2000, the KCO made a \$1,000,000 presentation to the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario's Promise campaign, to create the **Kiwanis Cardiac Ward**.
